BOWL GAME NOTES

The Teams

Las Vegas Bowl XXXIV will see the **University of Utah** (10-2 Overall/7-2 3rd Big 12) and **University of Nebraska** (7-5/4-5 T10th/Big Ten) meet each other on the football field for the fifth time in history on December 31 at Allegiant Stadium.

The Matchup

The first-ever postseason game between the Utes and Cornhuskers is on tap as the programs most recently faced each other 33 years ago. Nebraska will play in the Silver State for the first time ever while Utah will appear in the city for the 17th time. The Utes are in their seventh Las Vegas Bowl, which breaks a tie with BYU for the most all-time. Utah is 4-2 in this game and the four victories are tied with Boise State (4-1) for the most ever in this event. Utah's most-recent Las Vegas Bowl was 14-7 loss to another Big Ten opponent, Northwestern, in 2023. The previous four meetings between Utah and Nebraska all came in Lincoln (1968, 1980, 1989, 1992) with Cornhuskers winning each time.



Game, Date & Time

Kickoff is scheduled to take place at 12:32 pm PT on Wednesday, December 31. The date is the latest in Las Vegas Bowl history. This is the fifth Las Vegas Bowl played on a Wednesday but first since 2010. Las Vegas Bowl XXXIV will just be the third edition that takes place post-Christmas and the first on New Year's Eve.

34th Year

The Las Vegas Bowl turns 34 in 2025 with its 33rd matchup (there was no game played in 2020) and is currently the 16th-oldest bowl in existence. There are 31 defunct bowls that did not last as long as 20 years, just one that did last at least that long and there are 25 current bowls that are younger than the SRS Distribution Las Vegas Bowl.

Home Team

Utah (TV Sideline and Locker Room) serves as the home team while Nebraska (Press Box Sideline and Locker Room) will be the designated away team.

The League

While it would technically count as a victory for the Pac-12 alignment, the Utes can become the first team to win the Las Vegas Bowl as members of three different conferences. The Utes (MW in 1999 and 2001 and Pac-12 in 2014 and 2015) are currently joined by two teams in winning the Las Vegas Bowl from two different leagues: Boise State (WAC in 2010 and Mountain West in 2011, 2012, 2017) and USC (Pac-12 in 2013 and Big Ten in 2024).

Tickets

Public tickets to this year's game started at \$70 before fees.

Economic Impact

How important is having a highly attended college football game to the Southern Nevada area? In research courtesy of the Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority, during its first quarter-century-plus of existence, the bowl attracted more than 527,000 out-of-town visitors and pumped more than \$340 million into the local economy.

Welcome To The Huskers

This marks the fifth straight Las Vegas Bowl to feature a first-time team as part of the matchup. Wisconsin made its debut in 2021 while Florida was a first-timer one year later. In 2023, Northwestern became the first team from the state of Illinois to play in the Las Vegas Bowl. Last year, Texas A&M made its Las Vegas debut and was just the second team in the game from the Lone Star State. Nebraska, of course, will be the first team here from the Beef State.



Good To See You Again, Utes

Utah will make its record seventh appearance in the Las Vegas Bowl over four different decades. Former head coach Ron McBride brought his Utes here 1999 and 2001 (winning both times) and Kyle Whittingham coached in this event in 2010 (loss), 2014 (win), 2015 (win) and 2023 (loss), going 2-2. Now former Ute standout Morgan Scalley, who played in the 2001 Las Vegas Bowl and coached in four others, will get his turn as head coach. Utah, of course, has also enjoyed success in Las Vegas aside from bowl games, having compiled a 6-2 record playing at hometown UNLV at Sam Boyd Stadium from 1979-2009 and then going 2-0 in Pac-12 Championship games, downing Oregon in 2021 and USC in 2022 at Allegiant Stadium. Overall, the Salt Lake City school brings a 12-4 mark (.750) in games played in Clark County.

Conference Tie-Ins

The Las Vegas Bowl has the No. 2 selection (after the College Football Playoff selection) from the Pac-12 and shares that position with the Holiday Bowl. The Pac-12 Conference has been contracted to send a team to the Las Vegas Bowl since 2002 (after first sending a team in 2001) and that tie-in continued as current or former members now in other leagues remained eligible for the matchup. In the last two decades, the only times that a Pac-12 (or in this case a former Pac-12) team has not played in the bowl came in 2010 and 2016 when the league did not qualify enough teams and an at-large selection was used. The game's current, unique, three-conference agreement resulted in Wisconsin becoming the first Big Ten team to take a spot in the Las Vegas Bowl in 2021, Florida representing the SEC in 2022, Northwestern coming in from the Big Ten in 2023 and Texas A&M repping the SEC last year.



Television

For the fourth time in five years ESPN will serve as home to the Las Vegas Bowl. Veteran play-by-play announcer **Dave Flemming** and analyst **Brock Osweiler** will return for a second consecutive year to call the game. Osweiler is the only person to be in the booth after having earlier played in the event. Osweiler led Arizona State in the 2011 Las Vegas Bowl and despite the Sun Devils falling 56-24 to **Kellen Moore**'s Boise State Broncos, he completed 30-of-47 attempts for 395 yards and two touchdowns. The crew's field reporter will be **Dawn Davenport**, who also worked the 2021 Las Vegas Bowl.



The game will be available nationwide on Coca-Cola Bowl Season Radio. **Paul Loefler** will handle play-by-play while **Marshall Newhouse** will serve as analyst and **Tim Murray** will be on the sidelines.

BOWL GAME NOTES

ESPN Events

The Las Vegas Bowl became the first FBS postseason bowl game owned and operated by ESPN Events (formerly known as ESPN

Regional Television) back in 2001. ESPN Events, a division of ESPN, owns and operates a portfolio of collegiate sporting events nationwide. In the 2025-26 academic year, the 35-event schedule includes three early-season college football kickoff games, 17 college bowl games, 10 college basketball events, two college volleyball events, the premiere regular season college softball and gymnastics events, as well as the Band of the Year National Championship. Collectively, these events account for over 400 hours of live programming on ESPN platforms, reaching 60 million viewers and attracting more than 650,000 annual attendees. Each year, the portfolio of events features more than 20 Division I conferences and hosts over 4,000 participating student-athletes. With satellite offices in more than 10 cities across the country, ESPN Events builds relationships with conferences, schools and local communities, as well as providing unique experiences for teams and fans.



Game Site

Opened in 2020, the \$2 billion Allegiant Stadium (capacity 60,000 for this game) will serve as the host venue for the SRS Distribution Las Vegas Bowl for the fifth time because the 2020 game was not played during the pandemic. Also the home of the Raiders, Allegiant is one of 13 bowl games played in a current NFL stadium. The inaugural Vegas Kickoff Classic between Arizona and BYU was played here in 2021 and the second version of that event was staged Sept. 1, 2024, when USC downed LSU 27-20 before a stadium-record crowd of 63,969 fans. In addition, the Pac-12 Championship game was played at Allegiant each December from 2021-23. Located adjacent to the world-famous Las Vegas Strip, Allegiant Stadium is an award-winning global events state-of-the-art, multipurpose venue with a capacity of 65,000. Allegiant Stadium has hosted world-class music artists such as Garth Brooks, The Rolling Stones, Guns N' Roses, Taylor Swift and BTS with more legendary concerts to come. The fully enclosed stadium is also home to the UNLV Rebels football team and has hosted premier sporting events such as the CONCACAF Gold Cup Final and WWE SummerSlam. The venue hosted NFL Pro Bowls in both 2022 and 2023, and Super Bowl LVIII in February of 2024 – the first in Las Vegas history and hosted WrestleMania 41 in 2025. Allegiant Stadium is committed to giving back to the community through numerous diversity, inclusion, and community outreach initiatives. In addition, Allegiant Stadium is proud to be both LEED Gold certified and powered by 100% Nevada-sourced renewable energy and is dedicated to implementing sustainable practices and programs. The first 28 games of the Las Vegas Bowl were staged at now-closed Sam Boyd Stadium, which was shuttered as the bowl and UNLV football both moved to Allegiant after 2019. In its previous location, eight of the stadium's 10 biggest crowds for college football came during Las Vegas Bowls, including a then-state-record crowd of 44,615 to see BYU defeat Oregon in 2006.

The **Rossi T. Ralenkotter Las Vegas Bowl Championship Trophy** will be awarded to the winning team's head coach on the field in a ceremony following the game. The **Rich Abajian Most Valuable Player Trophy** will also be awarded to the selected player on a stage located on the field near the north end zone.



Rankings

The SRS Distribution Las Vegas Bowl has featured at least one ranked team from the three major polls in 15 of the last 19 outings. No. 15 Utah rose as high as No. 12 in the Week 16 CFP rankings while Nebraska did hit the AP rankings at No. 25 in Week Eight.

Nebraska In Bowl Games

Nebraska, which set an NCAA record by playing in the postseason for 35 consecutive seasons (1969 to 2003) comes into this game with a 27-27 mark. Before Las Vegas, the Huskers appeared in 18 different bowl games in school history, including 29 appearances in what were previously considered BCS bowl games (Fiesta, Sugar, Rose, Orange). Nebraska has played in 13 bowl games where either the Huskers or their opponent were crowned national champions. Head Coach **Matt Rhule** brings in a 2-2 mark in bowl games, compiled at Temple, Baylor and Nebraska.

Utah In Bowl Games

Utah comes in 17-9 all-time in bowl games and with a victory would become the first program to win five Las Vegas Bowls. The Utes currently have four wins here, which ties Boise State (4-0) for most all-time. Utah's seventh Las Vegas Bowl appearance is also the most among the 32 schools who have sent a team to play here.

Las Vegas Bowl Firsts

The Las Vegas Bowl has been home to some college football firsts. In 1995, Toledo and Nevada played in what was the first-ever overtime game on the Division I FBS level. The existing overtime rules were put into effect only for bowl games that season and the Rockets and Wolf Pack were the only teams that needed the extra time in the postseason. OT became standard for all college football games the very next season. In 2002, **Katie Hnida** of New Mexico became the first woman to play in a FBS-level game when she entered in the first quarter to attempt an extra point. The attempt, which was low, was blocked by UCLA during the Bruins' 27-13 victory. Also, 2011's game featured three scoring plays 98 yards or longer and was believed to be the first bowl game in history that included a kickoff return for a touchdown to start each half (Boise State's **Doug Martin** opened the game with a 100-yard kickoff return while Arizona State's **Rashad Ross** began the second half with a 98-yard KOR for a TD). The 2016 game saw San Diego State's **Donnel Pumphrey** become the rushing king of college football when he passed **Ron Dayne's** to finish with a career mark of 6,405 yards.

BOWL TIMELINE

- **DEC. 30, 2021** – The LV Bowl is played post-Christmas for the first time as the first Big Ten team to appear, Wisconsin, outlasts Arizona State in the game's new home at Allegiant Stadium.
- **NOV. 23, 2021** – The Las Vegas Bowl announces its third Hall of Fame Class: Kellen Moore (Player), Chris Petersen (Coach) and ESPN executive Pete Derzis (Contributor).
- **APRIL 2021** – SRS Distributors is announced as the bowl's new title sponsor through at least the 2025 game.
- **JUNE 2019** – Organizers announce the game will move to the new, \$2 billion Allegiant Stadium in 2020 and feature a new matchup featuring the Pac-12 Conference against alternating selections from the SEC (2020, '22, '24) & Big Ten (2021, '23, '25).
- **JULY 2018** – World-renowned brand Mitsubishi Motors signs on as the bowl's title sponsor for 2018 and 2019.
- **DEC. 16, 2017** – Boise State becomes the first school to win four Las Vegas Bowls with a 38-28 thumping of Oregon. The Broncos improve to 4-0 all-time at the event.
- **DEC. 17, 2016** – The Las Vegas Bowl celebrates its 25th year by pitting its first team from the state of Texas (at-large Houston) against San Diego State. With the nation following along, Aztec running back and Las Vegas native Donnel Pumphrey waits until the fourth quarter to pass Wisconsin's Ron Dayne to become the NCAA's all-time rushing king.
- **SEPT. 29, 2016** – The Las Vegas Bowl announces its second Hall of Fame Class: Marshawn Lynch (Player), legendary announcer Brent Musburger (Contributor) and Rob Dondero (Founding Father).
- **DEC. 19, 2015** – The famed Holy War between BYU & No. 22 Utah comes to Las Vegas as the bitter in-state rivals face each other in the postseason for the first time and quickly draws a sold-out crowd of 42,213 fans. It marks the 10th straight season of at least one ranked team.
- **JUNE 2014** – John Saccenti is named the new Executive Director of the Royal Purple Las Vegas Bowl.
- **SUMMER 2013** – The RPLVB announces extensions with both the Pac-12 and Mountain West conferences through the 2019 season.
- **SEPT. 25, 2013** – ERT welcomes new title sponsor Royal Purple, a synthetic oil & lubricant company, and the game is rebranded.
- **DEC. 22, 2012** – The bowl is played during the day for the first time in a decade. Taking on first-time visitor Washington, No. 20/15 Boise State becomes the first team to go 3-0 in Las Vegas and draws the second-highest-rated telecast in a decade and third-highest in LV Bowl history.
- **OCT. 5, 2012** – Las Vegas businessman Dan Hanneke is named the new Executive Director of MAACO Bowl Las Vegas.
- **DEC. 22, 2011** – No. 8/6 Boise State, the highest-ranked opponent in the bowl's history, routs first-time visitor Arizona State 56-24 in what is the final collegiate game of NCAA FBS QB all-time wins leader Kellen Moore. The game features three scores of 98 yards or longer as each half opens with a kickoff return for a TD and the Broncos add a 100-yard interception return.
- **SEPT. 20, 2011** – The bowl announces its inaugural class for the Las Vegas Bowl Hall of Fame to help commemorate reaching the 20-year milestone. The group is made up of NFL star and former Oregon State RB Steven Jackson, CFL record-holder and former Utah State QB Anthony Calvillo, former NFL and UNLV coach John Robinson, and LVCVA president and one of the game's founding fathers, Rossi Ralenkotter.
- **DEC. 22, 2010** – Heisman Trophy Finalist QB Kellen Moore leads Boise State to a 26-3 win over No. 19 Utah before the second-biggest crowd in the event's history (41,923). The No. 10 Broncos, who were an at-large pick, become the highest-ranked team to ever play in the game. The nation tunes into the highly touted matchup and the game becomes the highest-rated ESPN Regional TV bowl telecast in history.
- **DEC. 6, 2009** – The first-ever matchup between two ranked teams is announced as No. 15/14 BYU is selected to take on No. 16/20 Oregon State. The Cougars also break their own record as the event's highest-ranked team.
- **APRIL 14, 2009** – Collision repair and auto painting company MAACO Inc. signs on as the bowl's new title sponsor. Thus, the game is rebranded the MAACO Bowl Las Vegas.
- **DEC. 6, 2008** – Arizona becomes the sixth Pac-10 team to participate when it upsets No. 16/17 BYU 31-21 before the game's fourth consecutive sellout. The Cougars came in as the highest-ranked team in Las Vegas Bowl history.
- **OCT. 17, 2007** – The newly named Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl sees its allotment of public tickets gone nearly a month earlier than the previous record set in 2006 to mark a third-straight sellout.
- **DEC. 21, 2006** – No. 19 BYU, the first MW champion to play in the game, rolls past Oregon 38-8 before the largest crowd to ever witness a team sporting event in the state of Nevada – 44,615 – thanks to 4,100 temporary bleacher end-zone seats.
- **DEC. 22, 2005** – Cal defeats BYU 35-28 before a sold-out, then-bowl-record crowd of 40,053, which was the fourth-largest attendance figure in Sam Boyd Stadium history for a sporting event.
- **AUG. 11, 2004** – The bowl announces new sponsor Pioneer PureVision in time for the 2004 game.
- **CHRISTMAS EVE 2003** – Game features a record-breaking performance by Oregon State running back Steven Jackson. In the Beavers' 55-14 victory over New Mexico, the Las Vegas native scores five touchdowns to tie the all-time single-game bowl record held by two other players.
- **CHRISTMAS DAY 2002** – New Mexico placekicker Katie Hnida attempts an extra point, which is blocked, and becomes the first woman to ever play in a Division I-A football game.
- **FEB. 2002** – The Sega Sports Las Vegas Bowl enters into a two-year agreement with the Pac-10 and extends its agreement with the Mountain West for an additional three years.
- **CHRISTMAS DAY 2001** – Played for the first time on Dec. 25, Utah shocks USC 10-6, which garners a TV rating of 4.7 and a 14 share on ABC. Paid attendance is a then-bowl-record 30,894.
- **MAY 2001** – ESPN Regional Television (ERT), a subsidiary of ESPN Inc., assumes the ownership and management of the Las Vegas Bowl.
- **DEC. 21, 2000** – Making its first appearance in the Las Vegas Bowl since 1994, UNLV records a 31-14 victory over Arkansas from the SEC.
- **DEC. 18, 1999** – EA Sports Las Vegas Bowl features the first bowl meeting between the WAC and the MW. Two conference co-champions battle with Utah holding off Fresno State 17-16 behind Ute RB Mike Anderson's 254 yards on 34 carries (sixth-best bowl rushing total at the time).
- **DEC. 20, 1997** – Las Vegas Bowl VI presented by Reno Air unveils a new format that matches a representative from the WAC against an at-large opponent. The game features an offensive explosion from Oregon, which puts up 583 yards of total offense vs. 21st-ranked Air Force.
- **DEC. 14, 1995** – No. 25 (AP) Toledo defeats Nevada, 40-37, in Las Vegas Bowl IV to cap an undefeated season. The Rockets post the first-ever OT victory in Division I-A history.
- **1992-96** – The first five years of the Las Vegas Bowl featured champions of the Mid-American and the Big West conferences. Aside from UNLV's 52-24 lopsided victory over Central Michigan in 1994, the average margin of victory is four points.
- **DEC. 18, 1992** – The Los Angeles Times calls the inaugural Las Vegas Bowl "the most exciting bowl game of the year" as Bowling Green holds on to record a dramatic 35-34 victory over Nevada.



BOWL CONTACTS



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Now in his third decade as a member of the ever-expanding Las Vegas sports community, John Saccetti in 2014 was named by ESPN to serve as executive director of the Las Vegas Bowl, an ESPN Events owned and operated bowl game.

Saccetti (pronounced sah-SENT-ee) also serves as the executive director of the Vegas Kickoff Classic, an ESPN Events-owned early-season college football matchup that pits nationally known programs at Allegiant Stadium.

The veteran administrator is in his second year serving as chair of the executive board of Bowl Season (formerly Football Bowl Association), a group he was named a member of in 2021 after previously heading its public relations committee.

During his tenure at the Las Vegas Bowl, Saccetti helped usher in a partnership with three powerhouse leagues that span coast to coast as each December a team from the Pac-12 now takes on an opponent on a rotating basis from the storied SEC and Big Ten conferences. A member of the Las Vegas Stadium Authority's advisory group, he also oversaw the transition of the annual game from being played at Sam Boyd Stadium into its home at the state-of-the-art Allegiant Stadium.

Saccetti joined ESPN Events in 2001 and worked as an account executive on university projects at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas for four years in addition to the Las Vegas Bowl. He began his professional career in 1994 with the local minor league baseball team (AAA Las Vegas Stars) and hockey team (IHL Las Vegas Thunder). He worked in a variety of departments with the franchises, including public relations, sponsorships, marketing and operations, before finally serving as director of marketing. In 2000, he became marketing director for Vince McMahon's XFL Las Vegas Outlaws football franchise, which went on to lead the fledgling professional league in both single-game and season attendance.

He is a member of the board of directors of both the UNLV Football Foundation and currently serves as the chairman of the Southern Nevada Sports Hall of Fame. Honored in 2009 with the All American Football Foundation Bud Dudley Bowl Executive Award, Saccetti was a member of "Las Vegas' Top 40 Under 40" list published by Vegas Inc. magazine in 2012.

A native of Brooklyn, New York, Saccetti moved to Nevada in 1993 after graduating high school in Red Bank, New Jersey. He attended UNLV and earned his bachelor's degree in communications in 1998.

DAVE FLEMMING

ESPN PLAY-BY-PLAY COMMENTATOR (2nd LVB)

Dave Flemming joined ESPN as a play-by-play commentator for college basketball in 2010. In addition, he has since become a regular voice on the network's baseball and football coverage. He currently calls Saturday college football coverage on ABC and ESPN with analyst Brock Osweiler and reporter Stormy Buonantonio.

Flemming's play-by-play duties for ESPN have grown to include baseball as well. He has called televised Major League Baseball games for the network since 2014, including Monday Night Baseball. Each year, he calls MLB playoff games on ESPN Radio. He has also been involved with Little League World Series coverage since 2013.

Flemming also lends his announcing talents to ESPN's live coverage of golf majors.

In addition to his ESPN responsibilities, Flemming serves as the on-air voice for the San Francisco Giants on KNBR-AM radio broadcasts and select games on television. During his time there he has received three Northern California Emmys for his play-by-play commentary. In 2008, Flemming was also named the best of the new generation of baseball announcers by the Sports Business Journal.

Flemming handled the radio play-by-play duties for Stanford football for six seasons and has served as a substitute announcer on Golden State Warriors radio broadcasts.

The Alexandria, Virginia, native, who resides in San Francisco, received bachelor's and master's degrees from Stanford, and a master's degree in broadcast journalism from Syracuse University.

DAWN DAVENPORT

ESPN SIDELINE REPORTER (2nd LVB)



Dawn Davenport joined ESPN at the start of the 2013 college football season and currently serves as a sideline reporter for college football games on ESPN and ESPN2, as well as calling play-by-play for SEC Network volleyball.

In addition to her sideline duties, Davenport is Nashville's first full-time female sports radio personality on 104.5 The Zone. She previously worked as a morning show anchor for WKRN-ABC in Nashville, Tenn. for nearly 10 years. Prior to joining the three-hour morning news show, Davenport was an award-winning weekend sports anchor and reporter for the station. Davenport started her career at WWAY-ABC Wilmington, N.C., and then at WRIC-ABC in Richmond, Va. She also worked events for the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) and CSS Sports, Atlanta.

Born in Plano, Texas, Davenport was raised in Atlanta. An honors graduate from Auburn University in 2002, she earned a degree in mass communications/radio, television, film. Davenport was a three-year letterwinner and a two-time SEC Academic All-American member on the volleyball team.



The game will be available nationwide on Coca-Cola Bowl Season Radio. Paul Loeffler will handle play-by-play while Marshall Newhouse will serve as analyst and Tim Murray will be on the sidelines.



BROCK OSWEILER

ESPN GAME ANALYST (2nd LVB)



Former NFL quarterback and Arizona State standout Brock Osweiler joined ESPN in 2022 as a college football analyst. A seven-year NFL veteran, Osweiler played five seasons with the Denver Broncos and was part of their Super Bowl 50 championship team in 2015, in addition to stints with the Houston Texans and Miami Dolphins before retiring in 2019.

A second-round draft pick by the Broncos in 2012, Osweiler's collegiate career saw him rewrite the record books for the Sun Devils. A three-year letterwinner, Osweiler became the first quarterback in the history of the program to throw for more than 4,000 yards, finishing the season with 4,036 – still a program record. He set then-school single season records for completions (326 – still No. 1), attempts (516), completion percentage (63.2%) and threw for 26 touchdowns as a junior, still in the top 10 all-time at ASU.

A Kalispell, Montana, native, Osweiler now resides in Scottsdale, Arizona, with his wife and two daughters. Outside of football, Osweiler is an avid golfer and enjoys cooking for friends and family.

3. National sports media agencies
4. Official daily school newspapers of participating schools as space permits
5. Television stations with a full-time sports director
6. Radio stations with a full-time sports director conducting daily sports talk shows
7. Student or campus publications/broadcasts representing the two participating schools (yearbook, radio station, alumni magazine, etc.). Maximum of one press box credential and one photo/TV credential

Credentials will not be issued to spouses or TV/photographer assistants or grips.

NOTE: Media Credentials will offer PRE/POST GAME FIELD ACCESS for non-PHOTO/VIDEO or ALL-GAME FIELD ACCESS for approved PHOTO/VIDEO.

PRE/POST FIELD ACCESS will allow media on the field until 30 minutes before kickoff and starting five minutes remaining in the game.

ENTRANCE TO THE STADIUM & PRESS BOX

The press box will be open to the media four hours before kickoff (8:30 AM) and close two hours following the end of the game.

Media should enter Allegiant Stadium using the SouthWest Gate of Allegiant Stadium (on Polaris Avenue). Those traveling to the press box should enter the building (MEDIA & STAFF signs on the glass doors) move forward and head left on the concourse to reach the press elevators that will take you to the 400 LEVEL. This elevator lobby is located behind black doors just past the first set of concession stands (SoulBelly BBQ) on your left (approximately 200 feet from entering).

Seating charts will be posted throughout the press box.

Roster cards will be provided. A pregame meal will be served starting approximately 2.5 hours prior to kickoff (10:00 AM). Both hot & cold beverages will be available throughout the game.

Per NCAA and College Football Writers Association of America guidelines, the press box is a working area and cheering or excessive noise will not be tolerated. Unprofessional behavior will result in the confiscation of working press credentials and stadium security personnel will direct any violators to the exit.





MEDIA INFORMATION

PHOTOGRAPHERS/VIDEOPHOTOGRAPHERS

There is a full-service, field-level workroom for photographers on ZERO LEVEL of Allegiant Stadium labeled MEDIA WORK ROOM. It is accessible using the elevator located immediately on your right when entering Allegiant Stadium through the SouthWest Entry gate.

Bowl organizers will adhere to the NCAA's sideline control policy, which states that:

Sideline photographers are restricted outside designated areas and are reminded to stay behind the restraining line around the field. No media personnel, including journalists, radio and television personnel or their equipment, shall be in the team area or coaching box.

STADIUM INTERNET INFORMATION

The press box and field level are both equipped with complimentary wireless internet access.

TEAM PRACTICE POLICIES

Throughout bowl week, working press must adhere to the policies established by each participating school regarding access to players and coaches. However, each team is required to offer media availability at a minimum of one practice during Bowl Week in Las Vegas.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Following a 10-minute cooling-off period in the locker room, postgame interviews will take place in each team's respective media room. Both sessions will be shown in chronological order in the press box and then be available for viewing when the files are placed in the Game Night Google Drive.

The game's Rich Abajian Most Valuable Player, which is voted on by a media committee, will be announced on the field during the game trophy celebration. If the winner comes from the losing team, the award will be given in the team's locker room.

POSTGAME STATS, NOTES AND QUOTES

A Game Night Google Drive Link will be emailed to all credentialed media and will be the virtual home to all quarter, halftime and final stats; game photos provided by ESPN; postgame notes from the bowl and both teams; and video files of both teams' press conferences as soon as possible.





NEBRASKA HEAD COACH MATT RHULE



Matt Rhule is in his third season as Nebraska's head coach in 2025. Rhule led Nebraska to its first bowl appearance in eight years in 2024, guiding the Huskers to a victory in the Pinstripe Bowl.

Rhule enters 2025 with 12 years of experience as a head coach, including nine years in the college ranks and three seasons as the head coach of the NFL's Carolina Panthers. Highly regarded as a program builder and player developer, Rhule led successful turnarounds of the programs at Baylor and Temple and has improved Nebraska's record in each of his first two seasons in Lincoln.

The Huskers' two-win increase in 2024 continued his history of improvement throughout his college career. Rhule's teams have increased or matched their win total from the previous season in each of his nine seasons as a college head coach. Additionally, Rhule is one of just 12 active FBS head coaches to guide three different schools to bowl appearances.

After leading Nebraska to five wins in 2023, Rhule's second Nebraska team took another step forward with a 7-6 record. The seven wins were the most at Nebraska since 2016, and the bowl victory was the program's first since 2015. NU posted an unbeaten record against non-conference teams for the first time since 2005, and the Huskers were ranked as high as No. 22 during the season, Nebraska's highest ranking in eight years.

The steady improvement at Nebraska follows the path of Rhule's success at Temple and Baylor. Temple won only two games in Rhule's first season but in year three, the Owls set a school record for victories and played in the conference championship game. After leading Temple to a conference title the next season, Rhule moved on to Baylor with similar success. The Bears won only one game in Rhule's first season but in his third year, Baylor won a school-record 11 games and played in the Big 12 Championship Game and the Sugar Bowl.

Rhule led Nebraska to a 5-7 record in his first season in 2023, tying for the program's most victories in seven seasons. In the final year of Big Ten divisions, Rhule led the Huskers to three West Division wins, matching NU's total from the previous three seasons combined. NU also went undefeated in the month of October for the first time since 2001.

Rhule and his staff helped Nebraska rank among the nation's 15 most-improved teams in rushing defense, rushing offense, total defense and scoring defense. The Huskers also showed improvement in special teams, ranking second nationally with four blocked kicks. Individually, Rhule and his staff helped 10 Huskers earn All-Big Ten honors, including seven returning players who were recognized for the first time in their careers.

Nebraska improved to 7-6 in Rhule's second season, when the Huskers posted the program's first winning season and first bowl victory in eight years. The Huskers were ranked as high as No. 22 during the 2024 season, and Nebraska went undefeated against non-conference opponents for the first time since 2005. Five of Nebraska's six losses were one-score defeats, but the Huskers also showed improvement in winning close games as two of their final three victories came by seven or fewer points.

The Husker defense ranked in the top 20 nationally in rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense for the second straight season in 2024. Other than Nebraska, the only teams ranked in the top 20 nationally in rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense in both 2023 and 2024 were Michigan, Ohio and Penn State. Offensively, Nebraska boasted the nation's third-most improved passing unit in 2024. That group was led by a pair of true freshmen, as quarterback Dylan Raiola set Nebraska's freshman passing record while receiver Jacory Barney Jr. had the most receptions by a freshman in program history.

Rhule's success was not limited to the field, as Nebraska posted its highest team grade-point average in history and had more academic All-Big Ten selections than any other school during the 2024 season.

Following successful stints as the head coach at Baylor and Temple, Rhule moved on to the National Football League as the head coach of the Carolina Panthers. Rhule coached the Panthers for two-plus seasons, posting an 11-27 record.

Rhule inherited a Carolina team that had lost eight straight games to finish the 2019 season. He led the Panthers to a 3-2 start in 2020 before finishing with a 5-11 record that included eight one-score losses.

Carolina won its first three games of the 2021 season before injuries at the quarterback position contributed to a 5-12 record. Rhule then led the Panthers through the first five weeks of the 2022 season.

Rhule produced an impressive turnaround in three seasons as Baylor's head coach from 2017 to 2019, guiding the Bears to a 19-20 record.

Baylor won only one game in Rhule's first season in 2017 but two years later, the Bears went 11-3, becoming the first team from a Power Five Conference to go from 11 losses to 11 wins in two or fewer seasons.

Baylor finished 1-11 in 2017 but eight of the losses were by 14 points or less, including four one-score losses. But Rhule was successful in creating a strong culture and developing players, including quarterback Charlie Brewer, who was named the Big 12 Co-Offensive Freshman of the Year.

In his second season, Rhule guided Baylor to a 7-6 record in 2018 that culminated with a Texas Bowl victory over Vanderbilt. Baylor's six-win improvement from the 2017 to the 2018 season ranked third nationally and led all Power Five programs. His staff's player development was on display again, as wide receiver Jalen Hurd was named the 2018 Big 12 Newcomer of the Year.

Rhule delivered a record-breaking season in his final year in Waco in 2019. Just two years after a one-win season, Rhule led Baylor to a school-record 11 victories in 2019. The Bears began the season 9-0 to mark the best start in school history, and the season ended with Baylor playing in its first Big 12 Championship game and its second Sugar Bowl. With a second straight bowl appearance, Rhule became only the second coach in Baylor history to make a bowl game in two of his first three seasons.

With an 11-3 record in 2019, Baylor finished with a No. 13 ranking, the Bears' second-highest final ranking since 1951. The only losses in Rhule's final season were a pair of three-point defeats to a top-10 Oklahoma squad and a 12-point Sugar Bowl loss to a top-5 Georgia team.

Sixteen Baylor players earned all-conference honors in 2019, and defensive tackle James Lynch was named the 2019 Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year and Defensive Lineman of the Year.

Rhule's first head coaching job came at Temple, where he led the Owl program to new heights in four seasons from 2013 to 2016. Rhule guided Temple to a 28-23 record, including 20-7 over his final two years.

Rhule once again laid the foundation in his first year, when Temple finished 2-10. The final record did not tell the tale of his first season however, as after an 0-6 start, the Owls went 2-4 over the final six games of the season and never trailed entering the fourth quarter in any of their final six games.

With an emphasis on closing out games entering Rhule's second season, his team succeeded by allowing only 23 fourth-quarter points in 12 games in 2014. The strong finishes helped Temple achieve bowl eligibility with a 6-6 record.

With a solid culture and foundation in place, Temple tied its school record with 10 victories in Rhule's third season in 2015, and the Owls again won 10 games in 2016. He led Temple to back-to-back 10-win seasons for the first time in program history, as the Owls had produced only one 10-win season before Rhule's appointment as head coach. Temple also played for the conference title in both 2015 and 2016.

In 2015, Rhule led his team to a conference division title and Temple beat Penn State for the first time in 73 years. The Owls started the year 7-0 and achieved a national ranking for the first time in 36 seasons. Temple spent eight weeks ranked in 2015, accounting for half of the 16 all-time weeks the Owls have been ranked entering the 2023 season.

Rhule's final season culminated with another 10-win campaign and the program's first conference title in nearly 40 years, as Temple defeated No. 20 Navy, 34-20, in the American Athletic Conference Championship Game. The Owls set school records for season passing yards and total offense.

Following the AAC Championship Game victory over Navy, Rhule accepted the head coaching position at Baylor.

A native of New York City, Rhule earned his bachelor's degree in political science from Penn State and his master's degree in educational psychology from Buffalo. Rhule was a linebacker for Penn State from 1994 to 1997, helping the Nittany Lions to a 41-8 record with one Big Ten title, three bowl victories and a final top-20 ranking every season.

Rhule and his wife Julie have three children, Bryant, Vivienne and Leona.

UTAH HEAD COACH MORGAN SCALLEY



Morgan Scalley was officially named head coach of the Utah football program, Director of Athletics Mark Harlan announced on December 13, succeeding 21-year head coach Kyle Whittingham. Scalley has served as the Utes' defensive coordinator for the past 10 seasons, leading some of the most dominant defenses in program history. He has served on the Utah Football staff for each of the past 20 seasons in a variety of roles.

Scalley's defense in 2025 ranks No. 5 in the FBS in passing efficiency defense, 15th in interceptions (14) and 16th in scoring defense, allowing just 18.7 points per game. Utah's defense has scored three touchdowns in 2025, ranking 10th.

Scalley capped his illustrious playing career at Utah in 2004, helping to lead the Utes to an undefeated season, a Fiesta Bowl win over Pittsburgh and a No. 4 national ranking in which Utah became the first non-BCS team play in a BCS bowl game. He was a two-time Academic All-American (2003-04) and 2004 Mountain West Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

A 2004 University of Utah alumnus, Scalley earned his bachelor's degree in mass communications and graduated Magna Cum Laude with a 3.96 GPA. He added a master's degree in business administration from Utah in 2006.

Scalley began his coaching career as an administrative assistant with the Utes in 2006 before moving into a graduate assistant role in 2007. He has served as the Utes' safeties coach since 2008 and was Utah's recruiting coordinator from 2009-15 and special teams' coordinator in 2015.

Scalley has forged a reputation as one of the brightest defensive minds in the business. He was a finalist for the Broyles Award in 2019 when the Utes ranked second in the FBS in total defense. He has instilled the culture and identity of the Utah Defense known as RSNB, which stands for Relentless, Smart, Nasty, Ballhawks.

- Utah's total defense has finished in the top-half of its conference nine times in the past 10 seasons, ranking second nationally and first in the Pac-12 in 2019.
- Scalley directed the Pac-12's top rushing defense five times as coordinator (2016 and 2018-21) —including top-five national rankings in 2018, '19 and '23.
- The Utes have finished atop the conference in sacks and tackles for loss three times under Scalley, most recently back-to-back in 2021 and '22. The team also finished the 2018 season ranked 11th nationally and first in the Pac-12 in sacks.
- Since 2019, Scalley's defense has held opponents to 15 points or fewer in 36 games, which ranks ninth-most by a Power Conference program.

His ability to develop talent has propelled 33 Utes to the NFL ranks. In 2022, Scalley saw Devin Lloyd become the highest-drafted linebacker in school history, going in the first round (27th overall) to Jacksonville.

• After leaving Utah as a second-round draft pick, Eric Rowe played in three Super Bowls with the New England Patriots (2016-18). Scalley has four other second-round draft picks to date: safety Marcus Williams (New Orleans) in 2017, safety Marquise Blair (Seattle) in 2019, cornerback Jaylon Johnson (Chicago) in 2020 and safety Cole Bishop (Buffalo) in 2024.

• Third-rounders include linebacker Cody Barton (Seattle) in 2019, safeties Julian Blackmon (Indianapolis) and Terrell Burgess (L.A. Rams) in 2020, along with defensive end Jonah Elliss in 2024.

• Sione Vaki was a fourth-round choice by Detroit in 2024 after starring at Utah as a safety while also contributing on offense later in his career.

• Defensive tackle Leki Fotu was a fourth-round choice (Arizona) in 2020 and defensive end Bradlee Anae (Dallas) a fifth-rounder. Safety Robert Johnson played three seasons in the league after being selected in the fifth round in 2010.

• Scalley sent a trio of sixth-round draft picks to the NFL in defensive linemen Pita Taumoepeu in 2017, Kylie Fitts in 2018 and John Penisi in 2020.

• Jaylon Johnson was selected to the NFC roster for the Pro Bowl Games in 2023.

Scalley has coached 14 All-Americans (four consensus or unanimous), 21 All-Conference First Team selections and five Freshman All-Americans.

• His defensive All-Americans are headlined by Jonah Elliss (consensus in 2023), Clark Phillips III (unanimous in 2022), Devin Lloyd (consensus in 2021) and Bradlee Anae (consensus in 2019).

• Additional Utes to collect All-America on his watch include John Henry Daley (2025), Cole Bishop (2023), Sione Vaki (2023), Mika Tafua (2021), Jaylon Johnson (2019), Leki Fotu (2019), Julian Blackmon (2019), Chase Hansen (2018) and Hunter Dimick (2016) with Tom Hackett also being named a unanimous All-American in 2015 when Scalley served as special teams coordinator.

• Anae (2019) and Tafua (2021) were named Pac-12 Morris Trophy recipients, awarded to the league's top offensive and defensive linemen and voted on by the opposite side of the ball. Lloyd also became Utah's first Pac-12 Pat Tillman Defensive Player of the Year, taking the accolade in 2021.

• Linebacker Lander Barton was named the Pac-12 Freshman Defensive Player of

the Year in 2022, highlighting a pair of Freshmen All-Americans for the Utes in Barton and defensive tackle Simote Pepa.

• In 2019 Utah placed five defensive players on the All-Pac-12 first team (Anae, Blackmon, Fotu, Johnson and Francis Bernard) and one on second team, with four more garnering honorable mention. That marked the second year in a row with 10 players honored, with 2018's haul including first-team picks Hansen, Anae, Fotu and Jaylon Johnson.

• Scalley's other First Team All-Conference players include Daley, Van Fillinger, Hackett, Dimick and Marcus Williams. In addition, Robert Johnson was first-team All-Mountain West and Eric Rowe and Brian Blechen were both Freshman All-Americans.

Utah's defense began a new era in 2024 with the program's entrance into the Big 12 Conference. Once again producing stingy numbers, the Utes brought their long-running reputation of physicality into their new league. The Utes ranked third in the Big 12 and No. 19 nationally in pass efficiency defense (112.20) and held teams to 20.7 points per game, third-best in the conference and No. 28 in the country.

Utah's 2023 defense ranked second in the Pac-12 and ninth among Power Conference in total defense (307.2 yards allowed per game), marking the seventh straight season that the Utes ranked in the top-three of the Pac-12 in total defense (and fifth time in six years ranking top-two). Utah ranked 4th in the FBS in rushing defense (82.8), closing the Utes' Pac-12 era with eight consecutive seasons ranking in the top three in rushing defense in the Pac-12, including No. 1 Pac-12 ranks in rush defense from 2018-21.

Scalley's defense was a force during 2022, even after losing multiple upperclassmen to the NFL following the '21 campaign. It culminated with Utah's second straight league championship and Rose Bowl appearance. The Utes had six performances holding opponents under 270 total yards, contributing to the Pac-12's second-best scoring defense (21.4 points per game).

En route to the Utes' first Pac-12 championship and Rose Bowl appearance in 2021, Utah allowed only 341.6 yards of offense per game, ranking third in the Pac-12, and held six opponents under 315 yards. Utah ranked in the top-25 nationally and first in the league in rushing defense (119.4), sacks (3.00) and tackles for loss (6.9), and was 7-0 when only allowing only 100 rushing yards or less.

After returning just two defensive starters in 2020, Scalley's young defensive unit led the Pac-12 in rushing defense and passing efficiency defense, also ranking second in the league in total defense and third-down defense. The 2020 defense also plucked seven interceptions in just five games, second-most per game (1.4) in the Pac-12 and eighth-best in the FBS.

The 2019 Utah defense was one for the ages, leading the Pac-12 in total defense, passing defense, rushing defense, scoring defense, red zone defense, first downs allowed and third-down defense. Utah recorded the best statistical season by a conference team in the Pac-12 era in three categories: total yards (269.2), rushing yards (81.8) and points allowed (15.0). Scalley's unit recorded two shutouts, the most by a Utah team since 2003, and held six opponents to seven points or fewer, the most in a season by the Utes since 1969 (also 6). Utah held 10 of 14 opponents under 70 rushing yards, the most by an FBS team since 2006.

In 2018 the Utes finished second in the Pac-12 in total defense and scoring defense and finished in the top 20 in the nation in both. Utah's 2018 team ranked in the top three in the Pac-12 in every major defensive category (rushing defense, passing defense, pass efficiency defense, total defense and scoring defense).

Scalley fared well in his first coordinator assignment as well, with the 2015 Utes ranking first in the nation in net punting when he supervised the special teams.

Scalley also owns a long-standing track record as a widely respected recruiter. Utah's 2023 recruiting class was ranked No. 21 nationally by 247Sports, while Rivals.com rated Utah's 2012 recruiting class as the country's 25th best. In 2011, Rivals described Scalley as one of the top recruiters in the Pac-12 and a "recruiting coordinator on the rise."

He was Rivals' non-BCS recruiter of the year in 2010 and one of the top 25 recruiters in the nation overall. Rivals ranked Utah's 2010 recruiting class as the best by a school from a non-automatic qualifying conference and 32nd overall.

Scalley lettered for the Utes from 2001-04 and was the 2004 Mountain West co-Defensive Player of the Year, a second-team All-American by the Associated Press and SI.com and a unanimous first-team all-conference safety. He was a second-team All-MWC defensive back in 2003 and an honorable mention All-MWC punt returner in 2001 and 2002.

A native of Salt Lake City and graduate of Highland High School, Scalley is married to the former Liz Herrscher. They are the parents of two daughters and one son.

ALLEGIANT STADIUM



After staging the first 28 Las Vegas Bowls at now-closed Sam Boyd Stadium, the game moved to Allegiant Stadium for the first time in 2021.

Located adjacent to the world-famous Las Vegas Strip, Allegiant Stadium is a global events destination, highlighted by the arrival of the NFL's iconic Raiders in 2020. Allegiant Stadium, which won "Best Venue" honors at the 2020 World Football Summit Industry Awards, is ideally located for both visitors and locals, fully enclosed and climate-controlled with a capacity of up to 65,000 (58,000 for the Las Vegas Bowl). The technologically advanced stadium hosts world-class entertainment, including concerts and sporting events such as the Pac-12 Championship Game and the

Vegas Kickoff Classic and serves as the home of UNLV Football. The stadium project is expected to generate an economic benefit of \$620 million annually while creating 6,000 permanent jobs in Southern Nevada.

In addition, the stadium hosted Super Bowl LVIII (February 11, 2024) as well as the 2022 NFL Pro Bowl presented by Verizon and the 2022 NFL Draft.

BOWL HALL OF FAME

The Las Vegas Bowl Hall of Fame welcomed its third class in 2021 to help commemorate reaching the game's 30-year milestone.

The group was made up of college football's all-time winningest starting quarterback, Kellen Moore (Player), the only head coach to go 4-0 in the bowl game, Chris Petersen (Coach), and former ESPN executive Pete Derzis (Contributor), who had a big hand in growing the game into its current form. The Hall of Fame inductees were recognized at the ONEVEGAS gala at Allegiant Stadium December 29 as well as at the game the following evening.

"Three decades is a milestone for our game to reach and playing on a new date with our new matchup in our new home at Allegiant Stadium makes this year even more special," said Saccenti. "This impressive class will make it even more memorable. Coach Petersen was perfect in our game while representing two different schools. His former quarterback, Kellen Moore, also did not lose a Las Vegas Bowl and closed his storied collegiate career with us. And I have had the pleasure of working for and with Pete Derzis for 20 years, during which our game developed into a can't-miss event every December."

The Las Vegas Bowl Hall of Fame welcomes a class every five years but there is no time requirement to be eligible for induction. While there is no minimum or maximum amount of honorees in a class, inductees fall under the following categories: Player, Coach, Founder or Contributor.



PETE DERZIS BOWL CONTRIBUTOR

As a senior executive at ESPN Events, became a visionary leader of college football bowl games ... The Las Vegas Bowl became the first ESPN-owned bowl in 2001 ... Instrumental in the development of the Las Vegas Bowl into one of the company's premier annual events ... Oversaw the addition of the Pac-12 Conference as a partner league of the bowl in 2002 ... Helped the game grow into a major economic boost for Southern Nevada each December while featuring teams from the Pac-12 Conference and Mountain West ... Helped secure the Las Vegas Bowl's new alignment of three top conferences (Pac-12, SEC and Big Ten) that feature 40 powerhouse brands spanning the nation ... In March 2021, retired as Senior Vice President for College Sports Programming and ESPN Events on his 31st anniversary working at ESPN.

CHRIS PETERSEN HEAD COACH, BOISE STATE & WASHINGTON LAS VEGAS BOWL 2010, 2011, 2012 & 2019

Compiled a 4-0 coaching record in the Las Vegas Bowl ... One of only two coaches to win a Las Vegas Bowl at two different schools ... Only head coach to be undefeated in the Las Vegas Bowl with more than two appearances...Led Boise State to a 26-3 win over Utah in 2010 ... Led Boise State to a 56-24 win over Arizona State in 2011 ... Led Boise State to a 28-26 win over Washington in 2012 ... Led Washington to a 38-7 win over Boise State in 2019 ... Coached his final game as head coach in the 2019 Las Vegas Bowl ... Compiled a 92-12 overall record at Boise State from 2006-12 ... Compiled a 55-26 overall record at Washington from 2014-19...Paul "Bear" Bryant Award winner in 2006 and 2009 ... Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award winner in 2010.

KELLEN MOORE QB, BOISE STATE LAS VEGAS BOWL 2010 & 2011

Undefeated as a starter in the Las Vegas Bowl (2-0) ... Voted MVP of 2010 Las Vegas Bowl ... Led the No. 10 Broncos from the WAC to a 26-3 victory over No. 19 Utah from the Mountain West in 2010 ... Threw for 339 yards on 29-of-38 passing attempts ... Led the No. 6 Broncos from the Mountain West to a 56-24 win over Arizona State of the Pac-12 ... Completed 26-of-34 attempts for 293 yards and two more touchdowns ... Closed his collegiate career by becoming the first quarterback to reach the 50-win mark in history (50-3) ... Named First Team All-America by the Football Writers Association of America in 2010 ... 2011 Mountain West Offensive Player of the Year ... 2010 WAC Co-Offensive Player of the Year and finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting ... Spent six seasons in the NFL with the Detroit Lions (2012-14) and Dallas Cowboys (2015-17) before moving into coaching.



BOWL HALL OF FAME

The Las Vegas Bowl commemorated reaching the 20-year milestone in 2011 by inducting an inaugural class of four individuals into a newly created Hall of Fame. The group was inducted at the annual Kickoff Luncheon on Dec. 21, 2011, as well being recognized again at the bowl game the following evening. The inaugural class in 2011 featured Steven Jackson (Oregon State running back), Anthony Calvillo (Utah State quarterback), John Robinson (UNLV head coach) and Rossi Ralenkotter (founding father). The 2016 class welcomed Marshawn Lynch (Cal running back), Brent Musburger (broadcaster) and Rob Dondero (founder).

STEVEN JACKSON RB, OREGON STATE

LAS VEGAS BOWL XII - DEC. 24, 2003

Born and raised in Las Vegas, Jackson signed with Oregon State after starring at Eldorado High School ... Led the Beavers to a 55-14 blowout victory on Christmas Eve 2003 ... Voted bowl MVP after tying NCAA bowl record with five total touchdowns (four rushing, one receiving) to go with 149 yards rushing ... Selected in the first round (24th overall) in the 2004 NFL Draft by the St. Louis Rams and is now in his ninth pro season.

ANTHONY CALVILLO QB, UTAH STATE

LAS VEGAS BOWL II - DEC. 18, 1993

The California native helped Utah State win the 1993 co-Big West Conference championship and an automatic bid to its first bowl game since 1961 ... Completed 25 of 39 passes for 286 yards and three touchdowns in leading the Aggies to a thrilling 42-33 victory over Ball State ... It was the first and only bowl victory in the school's now-114 years of football history ... Voted the game's MVP ... Went on to become the CFL's all-time leading passer.

JOHN ROBINSON HEAD COACH, UNLV

LAS VEGAS BOWL IX - DEC. 21, 2001

The former USC and NFL coach took over UNLV in 1999 and one year later led the Rebels to their first bowl appearance in six seasons ... UNLV earned an at-large bid to the Las Vegas Bowl and defeated Arkansas 31-14 ... The Razorbacks were the only SEC team to ever play in Las Vegas ... Victory over Houston Nutt's squad gave Robinson the best winning percentage (.888) in NCAA bowl history for anyone with at least eight appearances (8-1 all-time in bowls).

MARSHAWN LYNCH RB, CALIFORNIA

LAS VEGAS BOWL XIV - DEC. 22, 2005

A native of the Bay Area, Lynch helped hometown Cal to a 35-28 victory over BYU in the 2005 Las Vegas Bowl while turning in one of the top offensive performances in the event's history ... He earned MVP honors after carrying the ball 24 times for 194 yards and three touchdowns and catches two passed for 27 yards vs. the Cougars ... The 194 yards is the third-most in a Las Vegas Bowl and he is one of just six players to rush for at least three TDs in a game ... The following season he was a first team All-America selection and the 2006 Pac-10 Offensive Player of the Year before being selected in the first round (12th Overall) of the 2007 NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills ... Lynch played nine total seasons in the NFL, including 2010-15 for the Seattle Seahawks and was a five-time NFL Pro Bowl honoree ... He revived his career this season with the Oakland Raiders.

ROB DONDERO FOUNDING FATHER

Dondero helped make the game a reality a quarter-century ago and then see tremendous growth under his current leadership as president of the bowl's committee ... Born and raised in Las Vegas, he would become one of his hometown's biggest champions and currently serves as Executive Vice President of R&R Partners, Inc. ... With a decades-long track record in the tourism industry, Dondero has had a hand in marketing world-class sporting events through his R&R Events division, including helping bring a college bowl game to town by securing the slot from the defunct California Raisin Bowl and moving the game to Southern Nevada in 1992.

ROSSI RALENKOTTER FOUNDING FATHER

As President and CEO of the Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority (LVCVA), Ralenkotter was responsible for marketing Las Vegas and Southern Nevada as the world's most desirable destinations for leisure and business travel ... Was instrumental in securing the bowl slot from the defunct California Raisin Bowl and moving the game from Fresno to Las Vegas in time for the 1992 season ... Helped the game grow into a major economic boost for Southern Nevada each December.

CLASS OF 2016

BRENT MUSBURGER BOWL CONTRIBUTOR

One of the most recognized and prominent voices in the history of sports television, Musburger served as a host and play-by-play commentator for multiple sports across ESPN and ABC ... Including the 2016 game, he called seven Las Vegas Bowls, which is tied for the most ever for any play-by-play announcer ... He retired from network broadcasting following the bowl game after he primarily worked college football and basketball game telecasts, highlighted by SEC Network beginning in 2014 and on ESPN's Big 12 Big Monday college basketball games since the 2009-10 season ... The Billings, Montana, native attended Northwestern University's Medill School of Journalism and his broadcast career began in 1968 as sports director at WBBM-TV in Chicago.

(THURSDAY, DEC. 23, 2004) – Wyoming won its first bowl game in nearly 30 years, upsetting heavily favored UCLA 24-21 in the 13th edition of the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl before a bowl-record crowd of 27,784 at Sam Boyd Stadium.

The Cowboys jumped out to an early 10-0 lead on a 39-yard field goal by Deric Yaussi and then a 10-yard touchdown pass from Corey Bramlet to Tyler Holden late in the opening quarter.

UCLA answered with two passing touchdowns in the second quarter, the first a 26-yard hook-up between Bruin quarterback Drew Olson and wide receiver Junior Taylor, cutting the lead to 10-7. After Olson hurt his knee, Bruin backup David Koral came in and kept the Bruin offense moving connecting with Craig Bragg twice, once in the second and again in the third quarter to give UCLA a 21-10 lead heading into the fourth quarter.

The Cowboys used a trick play to cut into the deficit, as Jovon Bouknight threw a pass on a wide receiver reverse that J.J. Raterink hauled in for a 22-yard touchdown that trimmed the margin to 21-17. Bramlet then completed the Cowboy comeback, firing a 12-yard touchdown pass to John Wadkowski with 57 seconds left in the game. Bramlet finished the game with 307 yards passing and two touchdowns, earning him MVP honors.



(THURSDAY, DEC. 22, 2005) – Cal's Marshawn Lynch rushed for career highs of 194 yards and three touchdowns to help the Golden Bears hold off BYU and win the 2005 Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl 35-28 before a packed Sam Boyd Stadium on Dec. 22.

Lynch earned MVP honors for his running efforts, racking up 194 yards and three touchdowns, while teammate DeSean Jackson caught two scoring passes for Cal, which improved to 8-4.

Cal took a 21-point lead into the final quarter after Lynch's 35-yard scoring run and Jackson's 22-yard diving TD catch in the third, but BYU quarterback John Beck responded with scoring passes to Jonny Harline and Todd Watkins, whose 9-yard grab with 5:35 left cut Cal's lead to seven points.

BYU had a chance to tie late in the game, but Beck's arm was hit by Cal lineman Phillip Mbakogu, and Daymeion Hughes intercepted the wobbling pass to seal the Bears' second bowl victory in three postseason trips under head coach Jeff Tedford.

Beck set Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl records by going 35-for-53 for 352 yards and three TDs. Enjoying playing before a partisan Cougar crowd among the bowl-record 40,053 fans, BYU made its first bowl trip in four years and finished the season at 6-6.





(THURSDAY, DEC. 21, 2006) – BYU quarterback John Beck stood on the podium above a throng of blue-clad fans so dense the green field below them was barely visible. After five years of frustration and a decade of postseason futility, BYU finally had something to celebrate.

Beck passed for 375 yards and two touchdowns, leading the No. 19 Cougars to a 38-8 victory over Oregon in the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl. BYU (11-2) closed the season with 10 straight victories, capping the streak with its first bowl win since 1996.

Beck was 28-for-46 with two interceptions, and got plenty of help. Curtis Brown ran for 120 yards and two TDs, Jonny Harline, voted game MVP, caught nine passes for 181 yards and Justin Robinson intercepted two passes for BYU, which shut out the Ducks (7-6) through three quarters.

Cougars fans who packed Sam Boyd Stadium with a record crowd of 44,615 stormed the field after the final play in celebration of the BYU blowout. It was the largest crowd in stadium history, breaking the previous high of 42,075 fans for UNLV's game against Wisconsin in 2002.

(SATURDAY, DEC. 22, 2007) – BYU (11-2) won its second-consecutive Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl, escaping with a 17-16 victory over UCLA (6-7) after defensive lineman Eathyn Manumaleuna blocked a 28-yard field goal as time expired. The second-largest crowd (40,712) in Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl history and an ESPNHD audience watched the thrilling game.

The unlikely ending followed a record-setting night by Bruin place-kicker Kai Forbath, who made a bowl-record 52-yard kick, along with attempts of 50 and 22 yards that kept the Bruins in it.

UCLA drove nearly the entire length of the field in the final two minutes to line up Forbath for the potential winner, but Manumaleuna and Brett Denney led a surge by the defensive line for the block and the Cougars got their first win over the Bruins since Steve Young was the Cougars' quarterback.

Cougar wide receiver Austin Collie, the MVP of the bowl, finished with six receptions for 107 yards and a touchdown in helping BYU win its 10th straight despite getting shut out in the second half.

Quarterback Max Hall threw two touchdowns in the first half as BYU grabbed a 17-6 lead. The Cougar victory avenged a 27-17 regular-season loss in Los Angeles and it snapped a seven-game losing streak to the Bruins.

(SATURDAY, DEC. 20, 2008) – Arizona quarterback Willie Tuitama threw for two touchdowns and ran for another in leading his team to its first bowl-game victory in a decade as the Wildcats rallied to defeat BYU 31-21 in the 17th edition of the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl on December 20.

Starring before a sold-out crowd of 40,047 fans at Sam Boyd Stadium, the senior signal caller won most valuable player honors after passing for 325 yards. Tuitama threw a 37-yard score to Delashaun Dean in the third quarter and then a 24-yard touchdown to Rob Gronkowski just a few minutes later as Arizona overcame a 14-10 BYU lead in the second half. He capped off a 21-point run with a six-yard rush in the fourth.

The Wildcats finished the season at 8-5 after playing in their first bowl game since the 1998 Holiday Bowl. BYU, which missed all three of its field-goal attempts, turned the ball over three times. Quarterback Max Hall lost two fumbles and threw an interception as the Cougars, who were making their fourth straight appearance in the game, finished 10-3 overall.

Utah could not capitalize early after recovering a Boise State fumble on its own 20-yard line, losing two yards on the drive before pulling a 39-yard field goal attempt wide left.


Linebacker Chaz Walker set the Utes up with great field position after intercepting Moore and making his way down to the 32-yard line. Utah's Joe Phillips connected from 44 yards out to give the Utes a 3-0 lead with just under a minute on the clock in the opening quarter.

Boise State answered in the second with 16 points, highlighted by the longest play from scrimmage in Las Vegas Bowl history, an 84-yard run from Doug Martin. Martin finished with 147 yards on 17 carries for the night, out-rushing Utah's entire team in the process.

After a Kyle Brotzman 29-yard field goal, the Broncos continued their momentum heading into the locker room by utilizing perfect execution of the two-minute drill with under a minute left in the half. Moore completed two straight passes before finding a streaking Tyler Shoemaker down the middle of the field from 25 yards out.

Boise State added a touchdown in the third quarter when Moore found Austin Pettis from 18 yards out and Brotzman converted a 21-yard chip shot in the fourth to cap the scoring at 26-3 in favor of the co-Western Athletic Conference champions.

The Broncos dominated offensively, outgaining Utah 543-200 for the game and held the Utes to just eight first downs on the night.

(THURSDAY, DEC. 22, 2011) – Sixth-ranked Boise State scored touchdowns in five different ways as part of a 56-24 blowout win over Arizona State to cap a year-long celebration of the 20th year of the MAACO Bowl Las Vegas.

In what was the final game of one of college football's most successful, Kellen Moore became the first quarterback in NCAA FBS history to reach 50 career victories as a starter as Boise State cruised to its first win over ASU to close the season at 12-1 overall for the second consecutive year.

The Broncos started out with a bang thanks to Doug Martin's 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown on the opening play. It marked the longest return in MBLV history and was the first time any bowl game started with a return for a score since Ohio State did it in the 2007 BCS Championship against Florida. Martin was not nearly done with his heroics, however, as he went on to earn the Rossi T. Ralenkotter MVP Trophy after rolling up a staggering 301 all-purpose yards and two TDs. That total included 151 yards rushing on 31 carries and 26 more through the air on three receptions.

Boise State jumped out to a 21-0 lead with a 14-yard TD catch by Tyler Shoemaker and then a two-yard TD grab by Matt Miller both coming from the arm of Moore. Miller brought in another one just before halftime to make it 28-3 at the break. The Sun Devils showed life, however, coming out of the locker room as Rashad Ross took the third-quarter kickoff back for his own highlight play a 98-yard touchdown. Later in the game, ASU was heading in from the one-yard line looking to close the gap even more but Brock Osweiler's pass was intercepted by Jamar Taylor, who returned it 100 yards the other way for a stunning touchdown that sealed the outcome.

When Travis Stanaway scooped up an ASU fumble and took it 26 yards for six points in the fourth quarter, it meant Boise State had scored five different ways: pass, rush, return, interception and fumble.

A majority of those yards went to Gerell Robinson, who shattered the record for receiving yards in the MAACO Bowl Las Vegas by finishing with 241 on 13 grabs, including a 21-yard score in the final quarter.

(SATURDAY, DEC. 22, 2012) – The 21st edition of the game had the makings of a third straight Boise State blowout in the MAACO Bowl Las Vegas, but this time the Broncos' opponent not only rallied but even took the lead in the fourth quarter. In fact, it took Michael Frisina's 27-yard field goal with 1:16 left to give head coach Chris Petersen's squad the victory on a gorgeous Saturday afternoon at Sam Boyd Stadium December 22.

Mountain West co-champion Boise State became the first team to start out 3-0 in this bowl with a 28-26 victory over Washington of the Pac-12 Conference in front of 33,217 fans, which was the eighth-biggest Las Vegas Bowl crowd in history.

With a 12:30 pm PT kickoff, the 2012 version was the first day MBLV since UCLA downed New Mexico 27-13 on Christmas Day 2002. It was also the sixth Saturday kickoff in MAACO Bowl Las Vegas history and the first since 2008. In just the second meeting between the two schools, the victory improved the Broncos to 11-2 while the Huskies, who became the ninth Pac-12 team to appear in the bowl, finished 7-6 overall.

Trailing 18-3 in the second quarter after a couple of BSU touchdown passes and field goals, UW used a 26-yard Bishop Sankey rushing score and a seven-yard run by quarterback Keith Price to make it 18-17 at halftime. After each side added a touchdown in the third quarter, it came down to a kicking contest. With under five minutes left, Washington's Travis Coons nailed a 38-yarder to give his team its first and only lead of the day, 26-25. However, after the Broncos got a big kickoff return, quarterback Joe Southwick coolly led his squad down field and set up Frisina's game-winner. Boise State later sealed the win when Jeremy Loane intercepted Price's pass as the Huskies neared midfield.

Southwick was efficient all day, finishing 26-of-38 for 264 yards, two score and no interceptions.

It was Sankey, however, who shined brightest. The sophomore tailback became the first player from the losing team to be voted the winner of the Rossi T. Ralenkotter MVP Trophy after he rushed 30 times for 205 yards and caught six passes for another 74 yards. His rushing total was the second-highest in Las Vegas Bowl history.



USC ended its season with a 45-20 blowout win over 21st-ranked Fresno State in the Royal Purple Las Vegas Bowl on Saturday at Sam Boyd Stadium. The Trojans (10-4) earned their first postseason victory since 2009, while Fresno State still hasn't won a bowl game since 2007, having lost six of its last seven.

Cody Kessler passed for 345 yards (22-for-30) and a bowl-record four touchdowns in USC's win over the Bulldogs under interim coach Clay Helton, the team's third head coach in less than three months.

Marqise Lee and Nelson Agholor hauled in two touchdown catches apiece, while Javorius Allen rushed two more scores.

Derek Carr, who finished 30 for 54 through the air, passed for a mere 217 yards and two touchdowns in his final game at Fresno State (11-2).

USC beat the Bulldogs, soundly, opening up a 35-6 halftime lead and defending Fresno State's attempt at a second half comeback. The Trojans made their statement in the second quarter, scoring three touchdowns over a nine-minute span.



(SATURDAY, DEC. 20, 2014) – Utah not only led the nation in sacks this past season, and prided itself by its stifling defense, which held five of its regular season opponents to 17 points or less.

In Saturday's Royal Purple Las Vegas Bowl, the 22nd-ranked Utes never missed a beat, as they routed Colorado State, 45-10, in the 23rd edition of the game.

Utah quarterback Travis Wilson ran for three touchdowns and passed for another en route to winning the game's MVP trophy. Wilson rushed for a season-high 91 yards on 11 carries and completed 17 of 26 passes for 158 yards.

Utah (9-4) scored three times in the first quarter and finished with 548 total yards, including 359 on the ground.

Devontae Booker ran for 162 yards and a TD and Troy McCormick ran for 86.

Colorado State (10-3) fell behind in the first three minutes and never found a groove for its normally explosive offense. It was the first time the Rams faced a ranked team this season, and marked their 16th consecutive loss against teams in the Top 25.

Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Year Garrett Grayson completed 21 of 35 passes for 242 yards, but was under pressure from Utah's defensive swarm, mostly in the second half, when the Rams were forced to throw the ball.



(SATURDAY, DEC. 19, 2015) – Utah scored 35 points in the first 11 minutes of the Royal Purple Las Vegas Bowl, and that's all the Utes would need.

In fact, it's all they ended up with in a 35-28 win over BYU, in the 24th edition of the Las Vegas Bowl, on Saturday at Sam Boyd Stadium. It was the first meeting in the heated rivalry known as the Holy Way, outside of the state of Utah.

Utah took advantage of BYU's disastrous start, scoring its five first-quarter touchdowns on turnovers – including a pair of interceptions by Tevin Carter – then held on for the win as the Cougars clawed their way back in the final three quarters.

Utah struck first in the game, when Joe Williams culminated a six-play drive with a one-yard plunge just four minutes into the game. Then, one play after BYU's Riley Burt returned the kickoff to the 21-yard-line, BYU freshman quarterback Tanner Mangum was intercepted by Tevin Carter, who raced 28 yards to extend the Utes' lead.

Six plays into BYU's next drive, Carter swiped Mangum's throw at the 34-yard-line and returned it 33 yards. Williams punched in his second 1-yard TD run and six minutes into the Las Vegas Bowl the Utes were ahead, 21-0. Mangum threw his third interception of the quarter on BYU's next drive, this time by Dom Hatfield, who took it 46 yards to the house to give Utah a 28-0 lead.

Four turnovers. Four touchdowns.

Make it five, only this time it was BYU's Squally Canada who coughed up the ball. Utah quarterback Travis Wilson, the 2014 Las Vegas Bowl MVP, dictated the five-play drive and finished it with 20-yard scamper up the middle.

The 35-point first-quarter set a Las Vegas Bowl record for points in a quarter, as well as a Utah record for most first-quarter points (since 1968).

After completing 14 of 30 for 137 yards, three interceptions and one TD in the first half, Mangum finished 25 of 56 with two touchdowns and three picks while rushing for a score too.

(SATURDAY, DEC. 17, 2016) – As San Diego State pulled away for its 34-10 victory over Houston in the 25th Las Vegas Bowl, a second victory for the Mountain West Conference on the opening day of the bowl season became an afterthought.

With 11:49 left in the game, the storyline changed as senior running back Donnel Pumphrey ran 15 yards down San Diego State's sideline, and became the NCAA career rushing leader. And has his teammates embraced him, tears ran faster than he did for 115 yards against the nation's No. 3 rushing defense.

Pumphrey – who had -1 yard after the first quarter – finished with 115 yards rushing and a touchdown to earn most valuable player honors in a game San Diego State (11-3) was installed as an underdog.

After a sluggish first half that saw Houston (9-4) open a 10-0 lead, the Aztecs scored 34 unanswered points en route to the win.

Pumphrey's senior total of 2,133 yards rushing ranks in the top 10 for an FBS player. Teammate Rashaad Penny finished with a mere 23 yards rushing, but it sent him over the 1,000-yard plateau, giving him 1,018 for the season, marking the first time in NCAA history one team had a 2,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard rusher in the same season.

While Pumphrey was doing his part to give his team a chance to win, San Diego State's defense dominated over the last three quarters. After gaining 102 yards on offense in the first quarter, Houston managed only 152 yards the rest of the way.



(SATURDAY, DEC. 16, 2017) – Cedrick Wilson caught 10 passes for 221 yards and a touchdown, Kekaula Kaniho returned an interception 53 yards for a score and No. 25 Boise State beat Oregon 38-28 in the Las Vegas Bowl on Saturday.

Brett Rypien threw for 362 yards and two touchdown passes — with two interceptions — to help the Broncos (11-3) break a three-game losing streak against Power 5 opposition, while Ryan Wolpin rushed for two touchdowns.

Troy Dye and Tyree Robinson each scored a defensive touchdown, and Justin Herbert was 26 of 36 passing for 233 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions for the Ducks (7-6) in new head coach Mario Cristobal's debut.

Boise State forced four turnovers in the first half, taking a 14-0 lead in the first quarter on Wolpin's 1-yard touchdown run and Rypien's 26-yard scoring pass to Wilson. Haden Hoggarth added a 39-yard field goal before an off-balance Herbert heaved a pass toward the sideline that was easily picked off and run back by Kaniho, who also had a strip-sack.

Oregon clawed back after Dye recovered a fumble on a botched Statue of Liberty handoff and returned it 86 yards for a touchdown with 37 seconds remaining.

A 65-yard reception by Wilson to set the Boise State single-season record for yards receiving got the Broncos right back in the red zone, but Robinson picked off Rypien's pass in the end zone and took it back 100 yards on the longest interception return in school history with 7 seconds remaining to make it 24-14.


If not for two defensive scores, the full extent of Boise State's dominance would have been evident. The Broncos outgained the Ducks 294-77 in the first half and reached Ducks' territory on 10 of 15 meaningful possessions in the game. They held Oregon to 47 yards rushing and 1.7 yards per carry, recording nine tackles for loss with four sacks while outclassing their Pac-12 foe on both sides of the line of scrimmage.

The sophomore running back from Fresno State capped his season by being named MVP after rushing for 212 yards and two touchdowns to help No. 19 Fresno State beat Arizona State 31-20 in front of announced gathering of 37,146 in the Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl on Saturday.

Rivers' rushing total of 212 yards ranked second in Las Vegas Bowl history, behind Utah's Mike Anderson (254) in 1999, while he also finished second with 286 all-purpose yards, behind Boise State's Doug Martin, who tallied 301 in 2011.

Quarterback Marcus McMaryion was 15-of-29 passing for 176 yards and rushed for a touchdown and to help Fresno State (12-2) set a school record for wins in a season after going 1-11 two seasons ago.

The teams played to a 17-17 tie in the first half, and Arizona State took a 20-17 lead with 5:33 left in the third quarter on a 44-yard field goal by Brandon Ruiz, but Rivers put Fresno State back in front 24-20 with a 68-yard burst up with one minute left in the third quarter, and later added a 5-yard scoring run in the fourth quarter to seal the victory.

The Bulldogs overcame turnovers on three consecutive drives in the second half, including when McMaryion threw the first of two interceptions to set up Ruiz's pull-ahead field goal in the third quarter. Dejonte O'Neal also fumbled off the pylon when reaching out to score on a throwback screen.

Fresno State's Anthoula Kelly added a 70-yard interception return for a touchdown, one of two interceptions for the Bulldogs' defense, while the stop unit stymied the Sun Devils 10 of 18 times on third down.

Washington dominated No. 19 Boise State – which Petersen earned his first bowl victory with in his first season as a head coach in 2006 – as Jacob Eason threw for 210 yards and a touchdown and Elijah Molden was named MVP after intercepting a pass and forcing a fumble, during a 38-7 victory over the Broncos on Saturday night.

Toward the end of the game, and as Petersen made his way across the field to shake Boise State coach Bryan Harsin's hand, chants from both fan bases could be heard for the former Broncos coach.

Which they did, as the Huskies got contributions all around in the bowl's most lopsided loss in five years.

Richard Newton rushed for 69 yards with a short touchdown run and threw a touchdown pass for the Huskies, and Salvon Ahmed added two touchdown runs. Myles Bryant added an interception, and six different defenders had a tackle for loss.

The Huskies wasted little time in seizing momentum by jumping out to a 17-0 halftime lead behind a methodical offense and tenacious defense that registered an interception of Hank Bachmeier's pass that was thrown up for grabs on the opening possession and easily picked off by Bryant. Andre Baccellia took a slant from Eason 17 yards into the end zone for the opening score.

The Huskies extended their lead to 24-0 early in the third quarter on a 2-yard touchdown blast by Newton after Molden picked off a screen pass by Bachmeier.

(SATURDAY, DEC. 30, 2021) — Braelon Allen may not be old enough to partake in much of what Las Vegas is known for, and has to offer, but he turned the Entertainment Capital of the World into his own playground in the 2021 Las Vegas Bowl.

The 17-year-old true freshman from Fond Du Lac, Wisconsin rumbled for 159 yards to lead the Wisconsin Badgers to a 20-13 victory over the Arizona State Sun Devils. Allen, originally recruited as a defensive player, began the season near the bottom of Wisconsin's running back depth chart.

Becoming just the third running back in Las Vegas Bowl-history to rush for 100 yards by halftime — he had 101 to notch his eighth 100-yard game of the season — Allen was named the game's Most Valuable Player, adding his name to a trophy that includes former NFL running backs Steven Jackson and Marshawn Lynch.

Graham Mertz finished 11 of 15 for 137 yards and had a touchdown to senior tight end Jake Ferguson, who caught three passes for 33 yards in his final game for Wisconsin (9-4).

The Badgers started 1-3 with Big Ten losses to ranked opponents Penn State and Michigan but answered with a seven-game winning streak to earn a 20th consecutive bowl bid.

Clinging to a seven-point lead, the Badgers took over at their own 3 with just under 10 minutes remaining and drove 90 yards to run out the clock in the first bowl game at Allegiant Stadium.

Arizona State quarterback Jayden Daniels threw for 199 total yards and threw an interception for the Sun Devils (8-5), who dropped to 3-6 in bowls since 2011. They're now 0-3 in the Las Vegas Bowl.

(SATURDAY, DEC. 17, 2022) – Oregon State held Florida to its lowest offensive output since 2015 and won the 30th edition of the SRS Distribution Las Vegas Bowl, 30-3, at Allegiant Stadium.

The 14th-ranked Beavers (10-3) reached 10 victories for the third time in program history, and for the first time in 16 seasons.

The Beavers came close to shutting out the Gators for the first time since 1988. However, Florida owns the longest active NCAA streak without being shut out, now 436 games, after Adam Mihalek made a 40-yard field goal with 37 seconds left.

Oregon State quarterback Ben Gulbranson was given the Rich Abajian MVP trophy after finishing 12-of-19 for 165 yards with one touchdown. Gulbranson also rushed for 15 yards on five attempts, including one touchdown.

Deshawn Fenwick came off the bench to rush for 107 yards on 21 attempts.

Silas Bolden caught a TD pass and Las Vegas-product Tyjon Lindsey ran one in for the Beavers. Damien Martinez also rushed for a TD before exiting the game in the second quarter.

The Beavers broke out early on the Gators (6-7), taking a 10-0 lead into the locker room at halftime, and seized control of the game early in the third quarter, when they took a 17-0 lead while dominating on defense.

(SATURDAY, DEC. 23, 2023) – The Northwestern Wildcats opened the season losing four of their first seven games under first-year coach David Braun with little to no hope of a successful campaign.

Saturday night they completed an improbable 5-1 finish to the season with a 14-7 win over Pac-12 foe Utah in the 33rd edition of the Las Vegas Bowl.

Ben Bryant, who was named the 2023 SRS Distribution Las Vegas Bowl MVP, passed for 222 yards and found Bryce Kirtz in the corner of the end zone midway through the fourth quarter for the game-winning score. Bryant, who left the game briefly after a scary hit just before the game-winning drive, was 22 for 34 with two touchdowns as Northwestern (8-5) closed out its season with a fourth straight win.

The Wildcats limited Utah (8-5) to 221 yards and had two interceptions and a fumble recovery. Northwestern senior defensive back Jaheem Joseph had two interceptions, which both came in the first half, tying four others for the Las Vegas Bowl record for most in a game.

Bryson Barnes was 8 for 13 for 55 yards with two interceptions, and Ja'Quinden Jackson rushed for 55 yards on eight carries to lead Utah, which lost three of its last four games.

Utah's 73 passing yards was the fourth-lowest in Las Vegas Bowl history and lowest since Utah had 71 in 2015 against BYU.

The Utes have been involved in the two lowest-scoring Las Vegas Bowls, beating USC 10-6 in 2001, and the

loss to the Wildcats. Northwestern's 7-0 halftime lead was the lowest first-half score in Las Vegas Bowl history.

The Wildcats struck first when Bryant connected with Cam Johnson from 12 yards out for a score with just 1:20 left in the first half, capping an eight-play drive that covered 75 yards.

(SATURDAY, DEC. 27, 2024) – USC (7-6) finished 2024 with a winning record thanks to a 35-31 comeback victory over the Texas A&M Aggies (8-5) in the 33rd SRS Distribution Las Vegas Bowl on Friday night before 26,671 at Allegiant Stadium. USC's 17-point comeback marked the largest in the event's history.

Things were relatively even in the first half of play. The Aggies struck first on a seven-yard pass from Marcel Reed to junior wide receiver Noah Thomas while the defense held the Trojans to zero points in the first quarter. It wasn't until 10:16 in the second when USC quarterback Jayden Maiava, who previously starred at hometown UNLV before transferring to Troy, threw a 30-yard scoring strike to wideout Ja'Kobi Lane to tie the game at halftime.

The momentum was on the Aggies' side out of the break, as they scored 17 points to build a 24-7 lead with just over five minutes left in the third quarter. Lane then caught his second TD of the night from 17 yards out to draw his team to within 10, kicking off a 21-0 spurt by the visiting team. Bryan Jackson's one-yard rush opened the wild fourth quarter and 10 minutes later Lane found the end zone again from 15 yards out to give the Trojans their first lead of the evening, 28-24.

The Aggies responded by going 75 yards on seven plays, capped by Reed keeping the ball himself and finding the end zone from 19 yards out to put his team up 31-28 just under two minutes left. The Trojans would answer with a 10-play march over 75 yards, ending with Maiava's bowl-tying fourth touchdown pass of the night, this time from seven yards to senior wideout Kyle Ford for what proved to be the winning score. Maiava overcame three interceptions in his return to Allegiant and finished with 295 yards while tying former Trojan

Cody Kessler's LV Bowl record with the four TDs.

Lane was named the Rich Abajian Most Valuable Player, catching seven passes for 127 yards and the record trio of TDs through the air. Reed was Texas A&M's offensive standout, completing 26-of-42 attempts for 292 yards and three scores while rushing for 46 yards and another TD on nine carries.
